

28TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 11 October 2020 - Year A

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I think it's fairly uncontroversial to say that, when we are given a choice, we quite often don't make the best decisions. The most obvious example is, of course, Adam and Eve who used their free will to disobey God by eating of the tree. We live with the aftermath of their choice to this day.

Today's Scripture readings together paint a picture of the feast that God has prepared for us. It is a feast to which He calls us insistently. Isaiah's prophecy in the first reading talks of "a banquet of rich food, a banquet of fine wines" (Is 25:6). At this metaphorical banquet there will be no mourning, no tears, and no shame. If we stop long enough to think, this is exactly how we would make the world if we had the choice; no death, no sadness, no regrets. And in today's Gospel reading we hear of the feast that the king gave for his son's wedding. Rather than expressing gratitude for the king's free gift, and earnestly attempting to respond to his invitation, we see that the invitees used their free wills to take different paths; "one went off to his farm, another to his business" and, remarkably, "the rest seized [the king's] servants, maltreated them and killed them" (Mt 22:5-6). It is one thing to politely decline the king's invitation, it is quite another thing to kill the king's servants. And so we hear that "those who were invited proved to be unworthy" ... to say the least (Mt 22:8)!

In the end we know that "the wedding hall was filled with

This Sunday is Dying Peacefully No Euthanasia' Sunday

This is a reprise of the event that was first held in Queensland parishes last November 17. The ACBC were inspired to roll it out nationally in 2020. There are many misunderstandings about what dying entails and how the Catholic Church teaches one should respond to it. This Sunday October 11 is a day that might help clear up some of that confusion. The Archdiocese led by Archbishop Mark is in support of high auality palliative care, respect for patient autonomy, preservation of personal dignity and a peaceful end to life. We are attaching many support documents. Please read through them and prayerfully consider this important item in the upcoming election. Palliative care can be a time of healing and tenderness. There are many stories where this time was a loving and treasured time for families when the proper support was in place. Let us rally our government to increase funding for this high level of care for all.

Matthew 22:1-14

Jesus began to speak to the chief priests and elders of the people in parables: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding." But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He despatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town. Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out on to the roads and

collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests. When the king came in to look at the guests he noticed one man who was not wearing a wedding garment, and said to him, "How did you get in here, my friend, without a wedding garment?" And the man was silent. Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot and throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'


