# Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (Year B) 25th November 2018

#### Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday is the Thirty-Fourth and last Sunday of the liturgical year (Year B). Next Sunday we will start a new liturgical year (Year C) with the First Sunday in Advent. As always on the Thirty-Fourth Sunday, we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. The Feast of Christ the King is the day when we are invited to commemorate His sovereignty over all of us. Jesus Christ has come. Jesus Christ is coming. Jesus Christ will come again. Jesus Christ is Lord of All.

Our Lord was nailed to His Cross with the words over his head: "Jesus the Nazarene, King of the Jews." Was this recognition or ridicule by Pilate? It was certainly one of the charges levelled against Him at His trial. The gospel stories describe for us how the Romans soldiers mocked Him by crowning Him with thorns, dressing Him in a purple robe and hailing Him as king. At the height of His popularity, the accusation would not have seemed so extraordinary. After He had fed the five thousand by the lakeside, He had to flee to the hills when the crowds came to make Him king. In the Gospel today, Jesus tries to explain to Pilate during His trial that He is indeed a king but that 'mine is not a kingdom of this world.' Earlier, Jesus had taught the Pharisees: 'The Kingdom of God comes unwatched by men's eyes' there will be no saying. See it is here, or see, it is there; the kingdom of God is here, within you.' (Lk 17:21).

We have to reflect very carefully about what the gospels tell us of the kingdom of God and Christ's own kingship. If through our Baptism we share that kingship, we should try to understand what that means.

The kingdom of God is obviously something quite different from the secular State. It has nothing to do with power, domination and coercion. It is not based on race or tribe or self-interest. It is not concerned with rank or human estimates of worth and honour. It does not aim at securing the material prosperity and security of its citizens. It is clearly not subject to the limitations imposed by geography and time.

Cardinal Basil Hume says that "the kingdom of God is an interior reality. Jesus himself said that those who are on the side of truth listen to His voice and belong to His kingdom (Jn 18:37). Its citizens are those who have died and are reborn through Baptism and faith in Jesus Christ. When they share His kingship, they are not changed outwardly, enjoy no material privileges or rewards; they are given something immeasurably greater and more lasting, an inner freedom from slavery to sin and from the power of death. They enter the kingdom but, in another sense, the kingdom enters them and transforms their inner selves, their minds and hearts, and in consequence begins to fashion new relationships with others. They live, as it were, in a different dimension, not subject to worldly assessment. The greatest among them may be the most despised and rejected in the kingdom of man. Like their master and king, then may themselves rule only from the Cross."

I can't think of any other better feast to celebrate on the last Sunday of the year than the feast of Christ the King. For it is fitting that the feast celebrating Christ's kingship is observed right before Advent, when we liturgically wait for the promised Messiah King.

#### 2 Minute Catechism Do we become angels when we die?

The truth behind a popular belief.

In popular culture, it is common to refer to people who have died as "angels" in Heaven. For many, this simply means that they think of the deceased person as being with God, where the other angels live.

However, sometimes this comforting thought becomes more concrete, with some believing that humans really do become angels when they die.

Is this true? Can a human person die and then come back to life as an angel?

The short answer is no. There is no possibility of a human becomina an anael.

When we die, our soul is separated from our body for the moment, but will be reunited with it at the end of time. To become an angel after death would mean that we become a different beina entirely.

Catholics believe that angels are unique, unrepeatable spirits.

They were created prior to humans; one theory that is an accepted Catholic belief is that on the first day of creation, when God made "light," the "light" he made was the angels (Gen. 1:3). This theory may even be confirmed when it says God "divided the light from the darkness," if that refers to the rebellion of the angels led by Lucifer (Gen. 1:4).

This idea is brought forth by St. Augustine in "City of God:"

For when God said, "Let there be light, and there was light," if we are justified in understanding in this light the creation of the angels, then certainly they were created partakers of the eternal light which is the unchangeable Wisdom of God, by which all things were made, and whom we call the only-begotten Son of God; so that they, being illumined by the Light that created them, might themselves become light and be called "Day," in participation of that unchangeable Light and Day which is the Word of God, by whom both themselves and all else were made.

This makes sense as the "Sun" and "Moon" were not created until the fourth day.

With or without this interpretation of Scripture, what is certain is that Catholics believe that all the angels who were to exist were created before any humans were made and they are different beings than humans.

So when a human dies, he doesn't become an angel; his soul doesn't either. It continues being a human soul, which will be reunited with its body at the resurrection of the dead.
